WHY IS THE GOVERNMENT VISITING?

The government has been checking on Unaccompanied Children.

- These visits are commonly called "wellness checks."
- The officer may be from a department called Homeland Security Investigations (**HSI**), they may be from Immigrations and Customs Enforcement (**ICE**), or they may be from another department.

The government is visiting to ask questions and confirm compliance with laws, including immigration laws.

- 1 The officer may contact **you or your sponsor** by **phone**, or they may show up **at your home**.
- 1 The officer may **identify themselves**, or they may be wearing **normal clothes**.



They may ask questions about:

- ? school enrollment
- if your home is safe
- contact with family
- ? forced work or harm
- ? moving without notification

RIGHTS & RESPONSIBILITIES

What you can DO:

- You do not have to answer questions.
- Without a judicial warrant, you do not have to open the door.
- Do not sign anything.
- Show a KYR card to the agent.
- Ask if you can leave.
- 🗸 Invoke your right to an attorney.

What you can SAY:

- "I do not wish to...
 - ...speak to you."
 - ...answer questions."
 - ...sign anything."
 - ...hand you any document."
- "I do not give you permission to enter my home unless you have a judicial warrant."
- "I do not give you permission to search my belongings.

IMPORTANT DOCUMENTS

An agent must have a judicial warrant signed by a judge to enter your home.

Ask the agent to pass the warrant under the door or hold it up to a window so that you can inspect it.





NEXT STEPS

How to prepare:

- Have a safe place for **documents** and copies.
- Attorney phone number on hand and memorized.
- Everybody has a card with constitutional rights, or it is in an easy place to see in the home.
- Everybody checks the door and outside before opening.
- Follow your **attorney's guidance** for anything specific to your area or community.
